What do you consider is the most significant action(s) we can undertake to protect and restore biodiversity and ecosystem function on private lands?

Self-assessment for land clearing must be withdrawn and replaced with an expert and independent process. Land owners may even appreciate finding out about what habitat and native fauna depend on their uncleared land. And they the land clearing assessment that is denied on environmental grounds may then be suitable for Biodiversity Funding. The due process could direct landowners to and facillitate this. Land clearing is not a right. Only suitable topographic and ecological sites are appropriate for clearing. Waterways as well as native fauna can be adversely effected by unconsidered or conditioned land clearing.

The real risk of this is that as this is muted land owners fear they will be stopped so it unleashes a whole epidemic of unwise and unecessary land clearing. Hence hand in hand (and proomoted in the media) there has to be a carefully orchestrated campaign that focusses on the benefits of a.) and c.) above .. and the incentives must be increased in and be upfront advertised as part of the program. All care and thought needs to be put into avoiding panic land clearing.
